Wyoming Land Trust Taps Kathryn Boswell to Serve as Director of Public Education & Outreach

Pinedale – Wyoming Land Trust has hired Kathryn Boswell to serve as Director of Public Education & Outreach. Boswell previously worked as special assistant to former Wyoming First Lady and U.S. District Court Judge Nancy Freudenthal.

“It is my pleasure to be joining the talented team of staff and Board members at the Wyoming Land Trust,” stated Boswell. “Conservation is vital to our quality of life, and people all over the state want to help. I look forward to increasing opportunities for Wyoming folks to have an active role in conserving the state we call home.”

In her new capacity, Boswell will spearhead outreach efforts across the state to Wyoming landowners and the general public. Boswell, a University of Wyoming alum, also serves on the Board of Directors for the Wyoming Women’s Foundation. She will be based in Cheyenne.

Launched in the summer of 2010, the Wyoming Land Trust is a statewide land trust that works throughout Wyoming for conservation and energy mitigation as a tool to maintain Wyoming’s unique character, scenic and cultural values. The Wyoming Land Trust facilitates conservation easement donations, purchases conservation easements, stewards conservation easements, educates the public and works collaboratively with other land trusts with the same mission of helping Wyoming landowners stay on their lands or in production agriculture. These services help landowners conserve Wyoming’s natural and agricultural resources privately and voluntarily.

“As a statewide organization, it is essential the Wyoming Land Trust offer support, counsel and outreach to landowners, supporters and partners in all

four corners of our state,” said Executive Director Lara Ryan. “Kathryn will be a great addition to our team and will benefit the Wyoming Land Trust in furthering our goal of helping landowners throughout the state preserve their lands for future generations while safeguarding production agriculture, wildlife and scenic vistas across Wyoming.”

The Wyoming Land Trust is an expansion of the Green River Valley Land Trust, which worked for the last 10 years in one of the core energy producing areas of Wyoming with ranchers and energy developers to conserve land and protect wildlife. The decision to expand the Sublette County-based land trust was based in requests throughout Wyoming for additional help from a land trust experienced in energy mitigation.
